### **Some Major Things to Consider**

- The word translated "eternal" in modern translations is actually "aionian," from which our English word "eon" is taken. It represents an age with a beginning and an end ... not eternity. A thorough search of all instances where this word is used will show that it cannot be consistently translated "eternal."
- The word translated "hell" in modern translations is actually a mixture of three different Greek words, none of which could possibly represent a place of burning, eternal torture. The most common term, hades, literally means "unseen," and is the place where <u>all</u> go upon death, righteous or unrighteous.
- In many cases where God's punishment is referred to, it is clearly remedial ... to refine the affected individual. It is not destructive, but a means to accomplish God's will. (Much more consistent with God's love!)
- There is a difference between the "evangel of the kingdom" proclaimed by John the Baptist, Jesus & Peter ... proclaiming the coming kingdom upon the earth -- and the "evangel of grace" proclaimed by Paul.
- If it is God's will that all mankind be saved (1 Tim 2:4), and if He operates all things in accord with the counsel of His will (Eph 1:11), then neither rebellious mankind nor Satan can thwart His plans.
- At the end of the ages, when death itself (the final enemy) is defeated (1 Cor 15:16), and when Christ delivers up the kingdom to God (1 Cor 15:28), and when God becomes All in all (1 Cor 15:28), this is the end of the ages as described in God's Word. All sin and evil is finally and totally defeated forever, and all mankind is saved thru the work of Christ.

# The original manuscript of the Bible is the perfect Word of God. There is much evidence to support this claim.

A translation should strive to relay as closely as possible the pure Word of God. A careful study will show, however, that our modern English translations are not "concordant," or consistent. While the salvation message is preserved in most every modern translation (salvation by grace through faith in Jesus Christ), much of God's revelation to mankind is clouded and misunderstood. A true study of God's Word must go below the surface of our modern translations to examine the original languages.

"The Concordant Version" is a faithful and consistent rendering of God's Word. Other study materials available from "Concordant Publishing Concern" help us to examine the Word of God in the original languages, without the benefit of an education in the languages themselves. Other good literal translations include Rotherham's Emphasized Bible (Kregel Publications) and Young's Literal Translation (Baker Books).

# Most mistakes in understanding God's Word stem from one of two sources:

- Use of a "discordant" translation that translates very inconsistently, and has bias built-in to the translation itself. Such translations are not really translations, but interpretations.
- Lumping all of God's Word into one category, without considering the full context. Who is the passage speaking to? What are the circumstances? Is this principle carried over to the present age, or was it strictly for the age during which it was delivered?

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#### "The Saviour of all Mankind"

1 Tim 4:9 "Saviour of all mankind, *especially* of believers."

The word "especially" would seem to give a special place to those who believe, but Christ is the Saviour of ALL mankind.

#### The Will of God

1 Tim 2:4 "God, who wills that <u>all</u> mankind be saved and come into a realization of the truth."

Eph 1:11 "...Who is operating <u>all</u> in accord with the counsel of His will."

If it is truly God's will that <u>all</u> be saved, can the will of man or Satan thwart His will?

#### For the Sake of the World!

John 3:17 "For God does not dispatch His Son into the world that He should be judging the world, but that *the world* may be saved through Him."

John 1:29 "Lo! the Lamb of God, which is taking away the sin of *the world*."

Romans 11:15 "Their (the Jews) casting away is the conciliation of *the world*"

Israel is hardened for a time, and then all Israel will be saved. And, this hardening (casting away) is for the conciliation of the entire world.

## **Everyone ... Every Knee ...**

Hebrews 2:9 "He (Jesus) should be tasting death for the sake of *everyone*."

Phil 2:9 "<u>Every</u> knee should be bowing....<u>every</u> tongue should be acclaiming" (Is 45:23)

God's Word tells us that at some future time, at the

end of this age, not only the elect or the Believers will bow their knee, but every knee will bow.

#### AII

I Cor 15:22 "As in Adam <u>all</u> are dying, thus also in Christ shall *all* be made alive."

Romans 5:18 "Through one offense for <u>all</u> mankind for condemnation, thus also it is through one just award for *all* mankind for life's justifying."

There are no limitations to the "all" who die thru Adam. How can we impose a limit on the "all" who are made alive in Christ? He died for the sake of all, and all will one day benefit. Can God's purposes be thwarted?

Col 1:20 "Through Him to reconcile <u>all</u> to Him (making peace through the blood of His cross)."

Romans 11:30 "For even as you once were stubborn toward God, yet now were shown mercy at their stubbornness, thus these also are now stubborn to this mercy of yours, that now they also may be shown mercy. For God locks up all together in stubbornness, that He should be merciful to *all*."

1 Tim 2:6 "One Mediator of God and mankind, a Man, Christ Jesus, Who is giving Himself a correspondent Ransom for *all*."

John 12:32 "I, if I should be exalted out of the earth, shall be drawing <u>all</u> to Myself."

Eph 1:9 "Making known to us the secret of His will (in accord with His delight, which He purposed in Him) to have an administration of the complement of the eras, to head up <u>all</u> in the Christ - both that in the heavens and that on the earth..."

Again, no limitation on the word <u>all</u>. At a future time Christ will head up <u>all</u>, for this is God's will.

## The End of the Ages

1 Cor 15:26 "The last enemy is being abolished: death"

The penalty for sin was death. Now death itself is defeated and even abolished. The penalty for sin in God's Word is not eternal damnation, but death ... now abolished!

1 Cor 15:28 "When <u>all</u> may be subjected to Him, then the Son Himself also shall be subjected to Him Who subjects all to Him, that God may be <u>All in</u> <u>all</u>."

As Eph 1:9 declares, Christ will head up <u>all</u>. Here in 1 Cor 15 we see that what follows is Christ Himself delivering to the Father <u>all</u> who are now subjected to Christ, so that the final outcome is God Himself becoming All in all.

Revelation 21-22 speaks of the kingdom which has come upon the earth .. a kingdom from heaven .. the kingdom promised by the OT prophets .. the kingdom proclaimed by John the Baptist and Jesus.

- Christ is seated upon the throne (Rev 21:5).
- Lake of fire-the second death (Rev 21:8)
- Israel is dominant
- . Describes a physical kingdom upon the earth

Now note 1 Cor 15 - The revelation given to Paul. These events obviously occur after Revelation.

- Christ yields the kingdom to God (1 Cor 15:24).
- Final enemy (death) is abolished (1 Cor 15:27)
- Jew & Gentile are joint heirs; neither is dominant
- Imperishable bodies (1 Cor 15:42)

1 Corinthians 15 describes "The Consummation" coming after the end of the ages, when the lake of fire (death) has accomplished its work, every knee is bowing, and God becomes All in all.
